We like to think that things slow down in the summer here at First Presbyterian Church, but this summer has proven otherwise. God has been busy in our midst.

Consider a quick review of the past five weeks:

- We sent 14 youths to the Massanetta Middle School Conference in Harrisonburg, Virginia, where the theme was "Welcome Home," exploring the words of the 23rd Psalm. A special thanks to Lee Herring for accompanying these kids and Rev. McGuire on the trip!
- We sent two individuals, Lee Herring, and Brad Brown, on a mission trip to Belize with Mike Blackmon of First Baptist here in Dunn. I cannot wait to hear back from Lee and Brad about their trip!
- We sent 16 high school youths to the Montreat Youth Conference in Montreat, North Carolina, where the theme was "In Joy," exploring what it means to find joy in God and one another. A special thanks to Gene & Blair Chance and Brian Foster for accompanying Meg and me on this trip!

- We welcomed almost 50 kids for Vacation Bible School last week, where our theme was "Stellar," exploring God's love through outer space. I can't even begin to thank all the individuals who helped set up and lead VBS, but I give thanks to Rev. McGuire for her leadership!
- We began the process of renovating the flooring in our sanctuary and did some work on our organ. I'm grateful to the Facilities Council for their leadership on this effort and for the gift made in memory of Granville Tilghman to make this effort possible. The renovations are taking place in two steps. Currently, the necessary organ work has been completed, and the parquet flooring in the sanctuary has been refinished. In a few weeks, the carpet will be replaced, and new hardwood flooring will be installed in the center of the sanctuary to increase resonance. If all goes according to plan, we will not have to worship in the fellowship hall again.
- Progress is being made on our Columbarium and Memorial Gardens. This past week, the concrete cast of niches was delivered on a 32-ton crane and placed on the columbarium site. In the coming weeks, masonry will be installed around the niches, which will be followed by landscaping work this fall. I'm excited to see the progress! A special thanks to the Columbarium Council for their work!
- Finally, we are already making progress toward our goal of being debt-free by the end of 2023. Since the beginning of the year, we've already paid down over \$20,000 of debt, and we're down to just over \$73,000 to go. I'm grateful to all those who have contributed to these efforts. You can expect to hear more in the Fall as we enter into stewardship season, but with faithfulness and patience, as one body together, I believe God will lead us to this goal by the end of the year.

Musicians have a love-hate relationship with the metronome.

Musicians have a love-hate relationship with the metronome. A metronome is a device that maintains a steady beat. Depending on the model, the metronome will tap, tick, ding, flash, or even speak the counts. The speed of the beat can be set to fast or slow or anywhere in between the two extremes. The metronome will keep the selected tempo until the musician turns it off or throws it out the window. And then, I am completely sure it will still be ticking on the lawn—not missing a beat. It is a pulsating reminder, that "I, Metronome, am correct," and you, musician, are off!"

The metronome is part tyrant and part tool. It is helpful in maintaining the beat while trying to work through a difficult passage, or keeping multiple players together. Musicians love that aspect, but the tyranny of the tick is also the part we hate. It never ebbs and flows like real music. Thus, you will never see musicians performing pieces with a metronome on stage.

Metronomes are mechanical. Musicians are human. Trying to sync up the human with the non-human is not always possible—nor should it be. But the mechanical does put a standard, an internal framework inside the musician. It keeps the arrhythmia at bay. Without an internal steady beat, the continuity of the music is lost. Musicians would be going their own way, in their own time. Individuality may be valued, but it is highly likely that the latest concert tickets you purchased were to hear music that maintained a steady pulse, with musicians conforming to an accepted tempo.

The metronome taps, the clock ticks, and the heart beats. Order needs to be maintained for life to flow. This is by design, no doubt. Our Father knew that we would need the steady reminder of His Love and His Word, to keep us in sync. We need Him to keep the chaos of our own way from drowning out the beautiful music He has purposed for us. The constant preaching and singing of His Word in worship is not a tyrannical hammer to beat us into sync, rather it's more like a reassuring heartbeat that supports life and security. What unimaginable cacophony would result if the pulsating reminder of God's love and Word were thrown out of the window? Perhaps you have already heard that noise. Suddenly, the ticking of the metronome becomes a comfort. Embrace the tick.

Colton Barber, Organ Concert




