Human history is a long story of people going to great lengths to find some sort of satisfaction in life, through power, indulgence, justice, expression, or enlightenment, usually with disappointing if not disastrous



results, and often to the detriment of others. But sometime around the middle of the first-century common era, a strange new cult emerged that would turn the entire social order upside down. This cult hailed a crucified Jewish commoner as the Christ of God, thus commonly known as the Christians.

No one knew what to make of the Christians. The earliest artifacts of their existence are the letters of a convert named Paul, who readily admitted that the whole thing sounded foolish to anyone who didn't believe it. One Roman observer called it "a most mischievous superstition."

But over the next two and a half centuries, this burgeoning faith would blossom into a social revolution, unlike anything the world had ever seen. It would spread throughout the classical world at a remarkable pace, claiming some thirty million adherents-- a full tenth of the Roman empire-- and most remarkably, without a trace of violent coercion. Instead, it gained a hearing in slums and slave houses by adopting orphans and abandoned children, taking in aging widows, nursing for the sick and dying, and befriending the lonely. It won converts of all ethnicities and walks of life, fostering a radically egalitarian community, eroding the divisions between men and women, servants and masters, foreigners and citizens, the privileged, and the needy. In other words, Christianity took over the ancient world not through political power or commanding avenues of influence but by subverting a culture that honored strength and brutality with a consistent word of hope and dignity in response to weakness and suffering.

Of course, in time, Christianity would fall victim to the same familiar patterns to which human endeavors inevitably fall, finding itself perverted into an apparatus of the very imperial power it formed against. But like a bomb of compassion exploding in history, the life of Christ had so deeply impacted the moral landscape that, today, as we look at our own moral landscape, we often mistake its crater as a natural feature.

Today statistically speaking, Christianity is on the decline in the West. Surveys show fewer people identifying as Christian, and attendance records show fewer people going to church. But so much of what we hold dear is remarkably Christian, whether we realize it or not. Arguably, it's only because people started worshipping a crucified Christ that we now believe in ideals like human dignity and human rights. Tragically, modern Christianity does not always reflect the virtues of unconditional generosity and welcome it introduced to the world. But ironically, it's on the basis of those very same virtues that today, Christianity is so often critiqued and dismissed.

## **Session Updates**

The Session met for our stated meeting on Monday, April 24th, 2023:

- 1. The Session approved a grant of \$2500 from the endowment to the Massanetta Springs capital campaign, with the intention of inviting Massanetta back for subsequent years. Massanetta is working to raise \$4.1 million to build new lodging for the middle school conference, which our youth attend every summer.
- 2. The Session approved a grant of \$1500 from the endowment to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance efforts in response to the recent Tornados in the Mississippi Delta.
- 3. The Session approved a grant of \$2500 from the endowment to Friends Fighting Cancer for the upcoming benefit event.
- The Session approved the purchase of an AED for the church grounds as an unbudgeted expense from the general fund. The cost of this AED will be just over \$3,000.
- 5. The Session approved a plan to go "Debt Free in 2023," which will include a special presentation to be made to the congregation on Sunday, May 21st, special efforts from various affinity groups of the church, and a solicitation for one-time contributions to be made in the fall alongside our stewardship campaign.

## Debt Free in 2023

On Sunday, May 21st, you'll be hearing a special presentation from our Session about the current financial picture of our congregation. A few things for you to know:

1. In January of 2023, our Session adopted a six-month budget to keep our budget balanced without cutting programs and expenses. This budget is set to expire at the end of June, and the Session anticipates that it will be adopting a slight deficit for the last six months of the year.

- 2. Our church pays over \$17,000 annually on our mortgage for the Fellowship Hall. If we can retire this debt, it will give us enough money to not only balance our budget going forward but better fund the needs of our facility.
- 3. As of today, the current balance of the church's debt sits at \$89,651.62
